Details of Ros Stewart's local history illustrated talk are on the back page. She would welcome your support.



"New" Post Office, One Year at Rhodes Hall.

The Post Office has now been open at the Rhodes Memorial Hall for a year and has been well supported by residents of Brockhampton, Sevenhampton, Charlton Abbots and Hawling. Complimentary comments have been received from customers, both local and visitors to the area, and from

Post Office Counters Ltd. staff and management.

We were audited on June 5th and the accounts received a clean bill of health.

The Post Office has been selected as one of only 200 in the country to receive the hardware and initial software for the Post Office's 'Horizon' computer sys-

tem. Further software was added in November. At present, the functions of the computer system are extremely limited. However, it is proposed that, eventually, every transaction across the counter will be processed through the computer - even the sale of a single stamp! The sub-postmistress is always grateful for customers' patience while she grapples with the latest "software update"!

Aalthough 'shop space' is limited, a small range of confectionery has been introduced as has stationery. Greetings cards sold in aid of Sue Ryder have proved popular. The cards are displayed on the carpeted bench under the window. Many elderly customers have enjoyed sitting on the bench to choose their card.

The bench has also been appreciated by weary

walkers and cyclists who, disappointed to find that the Post Office does not sell cold drinks, have been refreshed by a glass of water and a rest.

The siting of the Post Office in the lobby of the village hall helps to place it at the heart of the community and it is well used by customers attending events in the Hall,

e.g. Luncheon Club, Century Club etc. Its place at the community's heart is often apparent when the bench provides the venue for a good gossip.

Thanks to the tremendous support received from many quarters, the Post Office has enjoyed a successful first year. It is hoped that its success as a Post Office and as part of the Community will continue for many years to come.

NIS AT "COOMB"


The popular tennis sessions for 6 to 16 year-olds will be back for the Easter and Summer School Holidays.
