Gloucestershire County Council is offering to lend, initially for a year, a computer with Internet access, for the use of all Brockhampton, Sevenhampton and Charlton Abbotts residents.

The Hall Management Committee has agreed to find space for the equipment in the Hall and the Council is providing all the equipment on free loan. *Too good an offer to refuse!*

There will be a small charge to users of the equipment, but charges will be low. Pennies, not pounds!

Potential uses for this facility cannot be over-stated. It will be possible to access the Internet; consult bus, train and aircraft timetables; produce school projects; send E-mails to friends and relations abroad ("air-time" costs only 1p [one penny!] per minute at weekends!) and so much more. All in your own Village Hall!

More details later but it is hoped that the computer will be up and running before the Millennium!



Produce Show Outing


Wednesday 23rd June

Undoubtedly the Muirs, who bought Kiftsgate Court in 1918 and whose grand-daughter still maintains the gardens, were helped and inspired by Hidcote Manor, just up the road.

With its magnificent terraced situation and views the garden has been planned with great care and thought, every plant placed with a definite pattern of contrast to its neighbour. The RHS Journal in 1951 regarded it as "the finest piece of skilled colour work".

Kiftsgate's most famous species rose (although unfortunately not at its best until mid-July), a 'sport' of Rosa moschata, was planted in 1938 but not recognised as a separate variety until 1951 when it was named Rosa Filipes Kiftsgate. Measuring 80ft x 90ft x 50ft high it is claimed to be the largest rose in England.

There are many other unusual plants and shrubs.

The Post Office will close one hour early, at 4.00.p.m. on Tuesday 20th reopening on Wednesday at 11 am. April for the installation of more computer software.


Mail will still be collected at 5pm as usual.
