Foundation. Theaimistopl antayewtreein every parish in the land, creating a millennium symbol which is 'permanent and yet celebrating the abundance a nd vitality of life.' The slow -growing yew can withstand exceptional conditions enabling it to survive for thousands of years. These saplings have all been taken from plants over 2,000 years old. Ourtree was collected by Wendy Lee at a special distribu tion service at Painswick Church on 22nd October. (I hope there are still 99 yews in the churchyard!). I'm sure you'll join me in congratulating Eric & Josie andwishingthemandallwhohavel eftthevillag eswell.


The Minennium Post Box


